Paddling for a Purpose Denise Darval-Chang

As in most sports, one has to prove themselves in all aspects to be considered an authority. Denise Darval-Chang is one such person, and not many can boast a rap sheet in both the kayak and canoe paddling worlds like she can. Also, not many can see their purpose in life, and fulfill it as much as Darval-Chang has and will continue to do.

Darval-Chang began paddling for Hui Nalu Canoe Club at age 12. Forty years later, Darval-Chang is still paddling with Hui Nalu, is now the head coach and has made a name for herself in the paddling world beyond what she could have dreamt of at the age of 12. Not only is she recognized as one of the best steerswomen in the paddling community, but perhaps the most helpful too because of her business, Ocean Playground Shuttle. But probably what she is most proud of is that her two sons, Kainoa, 20, and Makana, 18, are following in her footsteps.

Darval-Chang grew up in the ocean and surfing famous Waikiki breaks such as Queen's and Canoe's, so when the chance to begin paddling came along it seemed like the natural decision. So, in 1973, at 12 years old, Darval-Chang began paddling and steering for Hui Nalu even though the youngest division was 15 and under. She became competitive early on and had high hopes for her paddling future. Darval-Chang recognized that the men and women in the Senior division were the highest caliber paddlers and

wanted to become one also. "From age 12, I strived to be the best I could be to ultimately someday be a 'senior woman,'" said Darval-Chang.

In 1979, six years after she began paddling, Darval-Chang became one of those high caliber paddlers and competed in the first ever Na Wahine O Ke Kai, the women's canoe race from Moloka'i to O'ahu and hasn't stopped yet. She has since paddled and steered the Na Wahine O Ke Kai 31 times, and missing only two since its inauguration. On top of that, Darval-Chang has won the coveted race

three times: twice with Hui Nalu in 1982 and 1983 and once more with the famous Team Bradley in 2006. And it's not likely that she will stop trying to get her fourth Na Wahine win.

Darval-Chang's rap sheet doesn't end at three Na Wahine wins. In 1982, 1983, and 1984 she competed in the Molokai World Championship solo surfski division, and placed second each time. Darval-Chang has also crossed the channel five other times in canoe relay teams of three or four people, winning or placing each time. She won one relay





with her husband, Earle, and then raced another memorable crossing with him and their two sons Kainoa and Makana. But out of all the races, out of all the wins, Darval-Chang's proudest moment was completing this year's PAA Kaiwi Relay with partners Tayte Brock, Shien-lu Stokesbary and Pauahi Loani. The race was the worst channel crossing in recent memory, with a headwind that only got stronger as the race went on and thus more difficult for the racers. Many competitors decided to not race all, while many more dropped out at various stages. After eight hours of paddling against the wind, Darval-Chang's team was thrown another wrench; the iakos on their two-man snapped and they were only a half-mile ahead of her sons, who were trying very hard to beat their Mom.

"I jumped off the escort boat and MacGyver-ed the iakos with a strap so we could finish the race, Tayte and Shien-lu headed for the finish at Magic Island with a kapakahi rigged ama half under water, and low and behold Makana goes sprinting by them with 100 yards to the finish line, while Kainoa yells from the escort boat to me 'It's all part of the race mom!,'" said

Darval-Chang.

She was proud of her team for not giving up because of the brutal conditions and their canoe troubles. And she was definitely proud of her sons even though they beat her and her team.

"I worried about my sons and was scared they would quit, it was that bad... so yes, I was proud of them for not quitting and I guess I can live with the fact they beat us, but had our iako's not snapped..." she said jokingly. Darval-Chang said she taught them to not be complacent and to be tenacious when racing, and that's what they did and have been doing for a while.

Both of Darval-Chang's sons competed in the PAA Steinlager Kaiwi Solo at 16 years old, an extremely rare feat for young paddlers. Knowing what it takes to cross the Kaiwi Channel solo, both physically and mentally, Darval-Chang escorted each of them for their first Solos and couldn't be more proud. "When they endured and accomplished the completion of their first solo crossing, tears of joy, pride and happiness and a feeling of overwhelming emotion," said Darval-Chang. Paddling and escorting for each other has now come full circle, as Kainoa now escorts

for her and her teams.

Besides being known for her accolades in paddling, Darval-Chang is known for owning Ocean Playground Shuttle. A shuttle service with a van and trailer to help paddlers with their vessels get where they need to go and train for upcoming races. The Ocean Playground Shuttle (OPS) brings paddlers, kayakers, and stand up paddlers then drops them off for downwind runs for a nominal price. Yet, OPS is only a part time job, in which she shares with her son, Kainoa.

When she's not paddling, or helping paddlers with OPS, Darval-Chang is a Health and Physical Educator resource teacher in the Department of Education. She also holds the head coach position at Hui Nalu canoe club and coaches kayaking for Punahou. "My purpose in life I have come to realize is, motivating, inspiring and encouraging people to exercise for all the inherent benefits no matter their age," said Darval-Chang.

Whether it's inspiring and motivating people with her own paddling skills and coaching knowledge, or shuttling paddlers so they can train, Darval-Chang is fulfilling her purpose.

Sasha enjoys both downwind runs and surfing her SUP.


“I like both! I feel that each one comple-


When asked about her future plans, she replied, “Anything to do with surfing of SUP surfing/paddling. I guess I have to go to college too, but I don’t

A Gift from Far Away (1400 miles away) Paddler Finds Makana Alii Paddle Far From Home

While Manoa Valley girl Liat Portner, was in the Northwestern Hawaiian Islands, on Kure Atoll, as a volunteer, participating in a seabird nesting habitat restoration project, which basically meant weeding, mainly chemically, but also manually, depending on weather and plant size. The island of Kure, is 209 acres, 1300 miles north of our island home, and is home to 18 species of sea birds, including Laysan and Blackfoot albatross. While weeding was her main objective, she also did some outplanting of native atoll plant species, including lots of naupaka! She also collected population data on 4 birdspecies, aided the NOAA monk seal program, and dealt with whatever marine debris and entanglement hazards existed and maintained the camp facilities.

On the day, Portner's boss, while doing a monk seal survey, called her on the radio soon after she left camp saying she found a paddle. Portner was ecstatic and asked if she knew what kind of paddle it was. My boss replied "something Ali'i" and i knew it was a Makana Ali'i, I flipped out. I have always wanted a Makana Ali'i since i was 12 and I've been trying for a year to get a paddle (we all know there is a high demand, and it sometimes takes awhile for the custom product) and here the Pacific Ocean delivered one to the "itty bitty" atoll beach that i just happened to be living on. It is one of the most amazing gifts I've ever gotten. (The big boss said it was okay to return home with the paddle.

On her return home, she was so excited to show it to Les and share the story of its journey. Liat thought, "On one hand, it would be cool to find out who the original owner is"

Portner started paddling when she



was 13 years old at Hui Nalu. Paddling throughout high school, she stopped when she moved to the mainland for college. With a passion for bodysurfing, she tried to get back into paddling, but when she transferred to the University of Hawaii, paddling conflicted with her ocean loves.

Portner got back into paddling during the summer, when she lived on the Big Island for an internship. She paddled 2 seasons with Kawaihae and joined Hui Lanakila for distance season. She paddles three to four days per week and is hoping to start one-manning soon. While bodysurfing, and canoe paddling take up most of her down time, the complete waterwoman can, surf, stand-up paddle, swim depending on the time of year or on how she feels. As long as she is doing something in the ocean, she feels good.



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

Hawaii Women Win in California



Carissa Moore (HAW), 20, has won the Vans US Open of Surfing over local favorite Courtney Conlogue (USA), 20, in peaky one-to-three foot (1 metre) waves at Huntington Beach Pier, taking the No. 1 position on the ASP Women's World Title Race.

Stop No. 6 of 8 on the 2013 ASP Women's World Championship Tour (WCT), the Vans US Open of Surfing plays both a crucial role in deciding the 2013 Women's World Champion and qualification for next season's ASP Top 17.

Moore got off to a dominant start in her final clash, earning an 8.17 and 7.83 to launch out to an early lead. The talented Hawaiian would hold on to the win despite a late-heat rampage from Conlogue, solidifying her third ASP Women's WCT event win this year.

"To be honest I'm a little shocked right now because I thought Courtney (Conlogue) won when the crowd erupted on that last wave," Moore said. "I let her

go and I had priority and it was a bad decision, but I'm stoked that it worked out in my favor. I was happy to be in the final and Courtney's in the title race and I had fun, but I was definitely nervous at the end of that heat. It's such an honor to win this event in front of this big crowd. I feel amazing!"

Malia Manuel (HAW), 19, has won the Association of Surfing Professionals (ASP) 6-Star Ford Supergirl Pro over fellow ASP WCT campaigner Paige Hareb (NZL), 23, in peaky three-to-five foot waves in Oceanside, California. Manuel led the Ford Supergirl Pro throughout the event's entirety, owning the top scores of each round while progressing to the Final. The Hawaiian's dominance would continue while securing the major victory, belting a 9.57 and 7.67 for powerful combinations on both

her forhand and backhand to earn her first victory of the 2013 this season.

"The past couple of days, I really had motivation coming off of a tough result at the US Open," Manuel said. "I wanted to do well there. It's good to be in California, it's like a second home to me. I wanted to get in rhythm and just finally have that push for a good result."

Manuel, current No. 12 on the ASP WCT, had struggled to find consistency at the early season stops this year and hopes today's major victory represents a turning point in her season.

"It felt good to finally have one event where everything came together," Manuel said. "I've had such ups and downs this whole year and I was really confident, but it just never all flowed in one contest. I'm happy it happened here and I'm looking forward to finishing up the year."
